Why Everyone Should Conserve

Across the western U.S., 20 years of record heat and low rainfall, coupled with high residential, industrial and agricultural water usage, have the region parched.

We're fortunate to live in a wetter, cooler area, and one with some of the lowest water rates in



the country. But the climate is changing here, too. Droughts last year and in 2016 quickly reduced our water supplies, and required some radical measures to keep homes and businesses supplied. (Remember seeing emergency water pipes installed along the Merritt Parkway in 2016?)

The East also lacks the space to create reservoirs on the giant scale of those in the West. So we're far from being able to take local rainfalls for granted — especially with whatever climate change has up its sleeve for us, too.

Our greatest good fortune is the simplicity of saving

water. Every day brings households many opportunities to avoid waste, whether it's a pint here and there, or thousands of gallons a year. Much of the water that's wasted is lost outdoors on our lawns and gardens. Broken or incorrectly set automatic irrigation systems can drench landscapes far beyond their needs, and day after day.

That's why we're urging everyone to limit outdoor watering to twice a week, even if you don't live in a town where that's not the rule (yet). If you have an irrigation system, have a licensed professional check it for leaks and faulty controllers. Clear Facts About Discolored Water

Though we're constantly working to keep your water clear, safe and pure, occasionally it may be discolored.

This is usually just a temporary, easy fix. It's often caused when water flowing through a water main dramatically increases or changes direction. Unusually high usage — by fire-fighting activities, a

main break, an open hydrant, scheduled water main cleaning, summer irrigation demands, an infrastructure project, or other factors — can also stir up naturally occurring mineral sediments in system water mains.

If it happens, hold off on using your water for drinking or cooking. Avoid doing laundry, too. Instead, run your cold water tap for five or ten minutes. (Don't run the hot water, as this could



pull sediments into your hot water tank.) If running the cold tap doesn't work, wait an hour and try it again. The problem should go away.

Before we start infrastructure projects that might temporarily discolor your water, Aquarion will notify you by mail. And if you've signed up online for our reverse 911 alerts, you'll hear about it that way, as well. To sign up for reverse 911 alerts, visit **www.aquarionwater.com/alerts**.
